Executive summary

The following report covers the period from January to March 2020, including the environment, social, health and safety and human resources areas.

Condor continues to implement its Environmental and Social Management System, which includes Environment, Community, Health and Safety and Human Resources. Work was focused on environmental awareness to workers and villagers in the social programs, support to institutions, maintenance of reforestation areas, maintenance and repairs of the tree nursery, waste management implementation including recycling, hydrocarbon waste disposal, and cleaning activities in artisanal miners processing areas. Other activities included the results presentation of the Participatory Water Monitoring Program and delivery of communicational materials distributed to villagers and workers. Environmental monitoring continues for La India, America and La Mestiza projects, including groundwater, surface water and weather data from our digital weather station and three other rain gauges.

The tree nursery "Oro Verde" holds a total of 7106 plants, which are watered, fertilized and kept clear of weeds and pests as part of its maintenance program. This quarter, a total of 130 plants were donated to government institutions for their environmental campaigns, and social activities. Activities in the reforestation areas included cleaning, fertilizing, watering and pest control.

During the first quarter of this year, the social team continued to work on strengthening the social license with the neighboring villages to the mining project through various involvement programs and various communication actions with interested parties.

The company's social investment has focused on social programs: Contributions and Donations that address issues related to education, health, sports, community grief, among others, during the period 39 contributions were delivered to people and organizations; Agua Fresca benefits 381 families from the Santa Cruz de la India village, Agua Fría and 26 property owners; Seniors program has 80 members; APROSAIC works with the neighboring villages to the project; Agua es Vida has 153 members; Small Businesses has 52 Entrepreneurs; and Small Mining benefiting 92 artisanal miners organized into 21 collectives; Youth in Action benefiting 28 young people; and Happy Childhood that benefits 28 children.

This quarter, activities were carried out that allowed us to strengthen relations with the villages, generating trust and appreciation with the project, such as: coronavirus prevention campaigns through 2 programs, house to house visits, visits to the sick, talks to artisanal miners, meetings with children and young people, among others.

During this quarter, a press release was also shared on our website about the support given to the execution of America and Tatiana open pits projects. A comprehensive stakeholder engagement exercise was undertaken in the four villages neighbouring the Tatiana (Mestiza) and America projects to ensure that the communities fully understood our proposals for the two mining projects, culminating in a public hearing at which the population expressed their approval, as well as expressed their doubts and concerns.

The company continues to support training and capacity building of its workers, providing financing and scholarships for English courses, master's programs and daily training talks.

Condor Gold has developed an internal prevention protocol with our workers, which includes sanitary measurements within the installations and towards the surrounding communities, such as:

- Talks and written panflet on sanitary measurements and COVID-19 prevention was distributed to workers.
- Avoid social gatherings as much as possible and promote social distancing in common areas.
- Use of masks for worker is obligatory in the installations and villages.
- Cleaning outside and inside of vehicles after each use.
- Alcohol spray (small) is distributed for all workers and for desk/computer cleaning.
- Benzalkonium chloride is distributed for all the workers to use in their houses to clean surfaces.
- Disinfectant booth, washing hands, shoe disinfection and thermometers are used at the entrance of the offices.
- Suppliers are met outside the office areas to reduce contact with workers.
- Guidelines for kitchen area and cleaning procedures have been modified and the use of common items has been eliminated.
- Villagers in the social programs and local schools have received talks, as well as sanitary supplies (alcohol, chlorine, etc).

1. INTRODUCTION

This report is part of Condor Gold's commitment to continuous improvement and monitoring of the implementation of its Environmental and Social Management System (ESMS) in the areas of Environment, Social and Community Relations, and Human Resources; ensuring transparency with its shareholders and relevant stakeholders.

2. OBJECTIVE

To inform stakeholders about the implementation of the Environmental and Social Management System in the areas of Environment, Social and Community Relations, and Human Resources during the first quarter of 2020.

3. ENVIRONMENTAL ACTIVITIES

3.1. ENVIRONMENTAL MONITORING

3.1.1. Baseline studies

Condor Gold continues conducting groundwater level and surface waterflow monitoring, as well as gathering weather data from its digital weather station and three rain gauges (La India, Agua Fría and La Mestiza locations).

The environmental baseline studies for the Tatiana and America open pits projects were completed based on the Terms of Reference of the EIA application process and they were approved to go to Public Consultation, which was completed the 28th February.

Surface waterflow

Monitoring of weirs continues. Constant water flow is only present in San Lucas V-notch weir (LIWR001), which showed a decrease from 15.2 cm in the last quarter to 15 cm in March; since dry season lasts from November to April (Photos 3.2.1.a-e).

Groundwater level monitoring

Weekly monitoring continues. In total, 25 sites are being monitored in 2nd quarter 2020. Three new sites will be included located in Nance Dulce village, after a census of water wells located in Nance Dulce village was completed in March.

In January, 16 sites showed a decrease in groundwater level between 1.37m and 0.01 m and an extreme variation of 4.14m in hand-dug well LIWL056. Seven sites showed an increase in groundwater level between 0.01m and 0.19m. Changes in groundwater level are common in hand-dug wells since they are used during dry season. Access to hand-dug well LIWL063 has been limited since the landowner has not been in the area during the monitoring period.

In February, 16 sites showed a decrease in groundwater level between 3.47m and 0.01 m. LIWL040 and LIWL057, both hand-dug wells showed the highest variations during the month. Six sites showed an increase in groundwater level between 0.02m and 1.04m.

In March, 20 sites showed a decrease in groundwater level between 3.72m and 0.02 m. LIDC323 and LIWL056, showed the highest variations during the month. LIDC317 and LIGT257 showed an increase in groundwater level between 0.02m and 1.96m, respectively.

LIDC291 showed no changes in groundwater level, LIGT250 continue to be dry.

Weather data

During this quarter, the new solar system was installed in January and a new sensor was received and installed in February; guaranteeing the integrity of the data on the weather parameters being monitored.

Condor continues registering rainfall data with three rain gauges located in Agua Fría village, La India village in La India concession and one in Espinito-Mendoza concession.

La India, Agua Fría and Espinito-Mendoza, rain gauges did not register rainfall data, since it is dry season.

3.2. ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

Condor continues implementing the Environmental and Social Management System, in compliance with internal policies and international standards.

This quarter, activities were focused on the organization and preparation of the activities of 2020, including the Annual Plan, the preparation of the quarterly and annual environmental reports, as well as continuing the reforestation plans, the tree nursery "Oro Verde", the waste management program, and environmental awareness through the 5-minutes talks with workers and support to the social team with talks to the social programs and artisanal mining area. Support to government institutions in their environmental campaigns.

3.2.1. Environmental Management System implementation

3.2.1.1. Environmental Awareness

Condor continued implementing and promoting environmental awareness, and environmental education.

Environmental awareness workshops were given to the Niñez Feliz program which reaches, 20 children; and a workshop on water use to 60 villagers from Talpetate and El Tanque villages as requested by the social team. Other workshops and talks were given to Agua Fresca program, Seniors program, and Agua es Vida program. 5-minute talks were given to workers on the environmental policy and results of water monitoring program done in November 2019. Topics were related to water use, fire prevention, planting trees for water protection, solid waste recycling, environmental policy and International Water Day.

3.2.1.2. Participatory Water Monitoring Program

In February, the presentation of the results of the November 2019 water sampling monitoring program was conducted in six villages: Carrizal, Santa Cruz de La India, El Bordo, Los Rastrojos, Nance Dulce, Ocotillo. Agua Fria village was covered in March.

The meetings were also used to promote environmental awareness and share communicational materials related to water protection, fire prevention and a calendar for the 2020 environmental celebrations.

3.2.1.3. Waste management program implementation

Activities related to waste management continued in La India concession and in the company's premises during this quarter. A total of 50 lb of paper/cardboard, 5 lb of glass and 20 lb of plastic were collected internally for recycling. A total of 140 lbs of cardboard and 49 lbs of paper were delivered to Los Pipitos program that were in temporary storage. General waste generated was about 550 lbs and 120 lbs of organic waste were used for composting.

Support was provided to artisanal miners on processing sites, in the establishment of environmental guidelines, cleaning activities and construction of seven metallic containers for recycling. A total of 387 bags of waste were gathered (about 45 lb/bag) and sent to the community waste dump in the first cleaning drive.

An inventory of hydrocarbon waste was completed, as well as cleaning of the storage area and a certified company was contacted to remove and treat the waste.

3.2.1.4. Soil protection and biodiversity conservation

As part of the remediation and biodiversity conservation efforts, Condor continues with its tree nursery in La India concession. Also, Condor continues implementing the reforestation plans in 5 ha located in Nance Dulce, Soledad de la Cruz and Los Rastrojos villages under agreement with landowners. During this quarter, the reforestation plan has included maintenance activities, such as: watering, fertilizing and pest control. Furthermore, water conservation activities have been implemented in those areas, including water reservoirs and protection of the existing water wells.

As part of Condor's commitment to the protection of biodiversity, a monthly donation to the Arlen Siu Zoo in León was implemented since last quarter 2019. These include seeds, medicine or other requirements, which are delivered in collaboration with MARENA-León.

3.2.2. Tree Nursery "Oro Verde"

The tree nursery "Oro Verde" provides the trees for all reforestation areas in the Condor concessions. Maintenance of the tree nursery continued, which includes watering, fertilizing and weed control as well as production of new seedlings.

A total of 7106 plants are watered, fertilized and cleaned of weeds and pests as part of the maintenance program of the tree nursery Oro Verde. 70 plants were donated to INAFOR – Achuapa (La Cuchilla concession) for their Arboretum project; 60 plants were donated in a social program.

Due to the strong winds, the tree nursery infrastructure was damaged and required improvement and repair: the mesh, bamboo infrastructure were changed and repaired. Other improvements are underway.

3.2.3. Implementation of reforestation plans and activities

3.2.3.1. La India concession – reforestation activities

Maintenance of reforestation areas in Nance Dulce, Los Rastrojos, and within the company's property continues. This activity is required to ensure the survival of the trees planted and are part of the environmental commitments of the company in the La India environmental permit. This maintenance includes watering and fertilizing, weed removal, fencing and firebreaks to protect the area of potential forest fires.

3.2.3.2. Real de la Cruz concession – reforestation activites

This quarter, maintenance of reforestation areas in Soledad de la Cruz village was carried out, which included watering, fertilizing, and weed removal. Including the installations of signs to protect the water sources in the reforestation area.

In March, a donation was made to San Isidro municipality and INAFOR for the Inauguration campaign of the Forest Fire Prevention.

4. SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

4.1. STAKEHOLDERS ENGAGEMENT IMPLEMENTATION

4.1.1. Meetings with local stakeholders

During this quarter, the company held more than 32 meetings with the leaders from social programs to coordinate activities to be developed with program members and the community in general. Main topics addressed were:

- Water program
- Senior program
- Social contributions
- Businesses program
- APROSAIC
- Artisanal Minina
- Youth in action
- Happy childhood

4.1.2. Bilateral meetings with local stakeholders

Bilateral meetings

During this period, the company held 20 bilateral meetings, with local organizations in the Area of Direct Influence (ADI) and with NGOs and/or institutions interested in collaborating with social programs.

4.1.3. Artisanal mining

Within the artisanal mining program, the following activities were carried out:

a) Miners' Board of Directors' activities (COOPTRAMIN)

✓ Wellness workshops

Every Friday, health circles were held in Tanque and Talpetate villages, fulfilling the expected attendance of 30 people per community. In these circles, various topics are addressed to improve the health knowledge of the inhabitants, covering topics of current importance such as: Prevention of viral diseases, hand washing, preventative measures on COVID-19. Plus, Pap smears to women from El Tanque were carried out in collaboration with the health post of Santa Cruz de La India.







b) Activities with the Board of Independent Miners who work in La Mestiza

√ Training in rescue techniques

Activities were held in San Juan, as well as in La Mestiza property owned by the company; which included training seminar in rescue techniques and first aid, carried out by by the León branch of the Red Cross.

A total of 82 artisanal miners from the surrounding communities and from other areas of the country and working in La India concession received training.









✓ Campaign on working safely

The "Working Safely" campaign was also launched, targeting artisanal miners at their work sites to implement methods to improve their infrastructures to prevent accidents due to collapse of underground workings. This campaign is accompanied by the delivery of tools for daily use; and included artisanal miners located in La Mestiza, San Juan and others located in El Tanque and Talpetate.





✓ Celebration of women's day

International Women's Day celebration was held with artisanal miners' wives. This activity was held on Tuesday, 10th March in Agua Fría village and a talk was given by Police personnel.



✓ Inspections of risks at extraction sites is carried out in La Mestiza:

During this quarter, a total of 4 geo-technical inspections were done to determine safety aspects in each extraction site located in Mestiza property.

✓ Artisanal mining Census in Estrella Concession

Ministry of Energy and Mines requested Condor participation in the Artisanal Mining Commission of Siuna for a site visit to its concession Estrella, located in Siuna, RAAN.

An inspection on La Estrella concession was carried out with members of the Siuna Municipal Commission for Artisanal Mining with the aim to know how artisanal mining work on site, pollution of water sources, use of explosives and handling of mercury in the processing sites.

On one property, 18 extraction sites were counted with a total of 117 reported artisanal miners working there. In 16 out of the 18 extracting sites, blasting is used. These blasting are performed by staff of SIUNA COOPERATIVE who were previously trained by EXPLOTEC (blasting company).

For processing, there are 2 sites located on the same property, with 34 active ball mills, and a further 12 ball mills on a separate propertyl, all running on diesel engines. In total 52 people are employed on the processing sites.

On the riverside, women typically accompanied by children work washing river sands, but on the day of the inspection they had already been alerted and no one was found in that area.





4.1.4. Communication campaign

During this quarter, we continue to execute the communication strategy through assemblies, bilateral meetings, union meetings, home visits, Facebook, YouTube and website. With the use of these communication channels we managed to be in direct contact with the population and spread our work.

As part of our public relations strategy, a press release of national interest was published, called:



4.1.4.1. Tatiana and America Projects communication campaign and public hearing

For the first quarter of the year, a communication and relationship campaign was developed and executed with the 4 neighboring villages to the Tatiana (Mestiza) and America open pits projects in order to inform them of the plans, address their queries and concerns and obtain the social license for the execution of both projects.

Likewise, activities were carried out in the areas of health, community leadership, recreation and education in the villages to contribute to the quality of life of the people of these villages. In addition, a project is underway that includes the construction of 40 latrines to improve the public health and hygiene of the inhabitants of this area; as well as the repair of the most damaged areas of the road that goes to the village of El Tanque.

The general communication campaign of the project reached a total of 791 families in the nearby villages, Agua Fria, Santa Cruz de la India, artisanal mining work areas, company collaborators, local and departmental actors and villages in the Indirect Area of Influence of La India project.

For this campaign, various methodologies were used, such as assemblies, bilateral meetings and house-to-house visits. Among the concerns raised by people are: employment, start of the mine, concerns about artisanal mining future, start date of the Mina la India water project, start of training, doubts about the blasting. Public Consultation of the Tatiana and America open pits projects:

On 28th February, the two public consultations of the projects were carried out with the participation of 450 people, including children and adults. People who attended reacted in positive way to the presentations, 5 concerns were raised related to artisanal mining and social projects for communities. The hearing was held in a productive family atmosphere.

Audience participants included the Inter-Institutional Commission, company workers, residents of the nearby communities, the national police, the Red Cross, MITRAB León, priests from El Jicaral and Santa Rosa del Peñón and representatives of the involvement programs.

4.2. COMMUNITY RELATIONS PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

La India Gold developed a social investment plan oriented to generate conditions to promote better community relations in direct and indirect areas of influence, with a focus on water, communication, support to small mining, among other contributions and programs.

During this quarter **the investment was U\$ 45,811** in the following items:



Fresh Water Program in the Santa Cruz community of India

From January to March 2020, the water program continued to be developed, the delivery of two free potable water canisters and two subsidized free potable water canisters continued, directly benefiting 381 households in the Santa Cruz de la India and Agua Fria.

Support was also provided to vulnerable groups: elderly, people with disabilities and multi-household families through the free delivery of the four potable water canisters. This reduces the problem of water scarcity in the area.

In the village of Santa Cruz de la India, 2,865 potable water canisters have been delivered in this period.

Activities within the water program:

- Registration campaign continues and the registration of 1 family in the village corresponding to 1 house has been achieved.
- 256 families continue to receive their water cannisters weekly.
- 335 women beneficiaries of the program received a gift in celebration of Women's Day.
- 256 families received recommendations on cleaning the cannister and dispenser to prevent virus infections.
- Beneficiaries of the program were informed with the quarterly magazine Voice of India.

Fresh Water Program in the Agua Fría community

The freshwater program reaches every home in the Agua Fría village, also permanently and specially benefiting families where there are older adults and people with disabilities.

In the village 1,428 cannisters of purified water were delivered in the period.

Activities within the program:

- In the Agua Fría village, we continue visiting and sharing with families.
- 125 families receive their cannisters weekly
- 120 women beneficiaries of the program received a gift in celebration of Women's Day
- 125 families received recommendations on cleaning the bottle and dispenser for virus prevention.

APROSAIC

APROSAIC has focused its work on cultural initiatives, strengthening relationships with community leaders, local schools and cultural activities. During this month, APROSAIC focused on executing activities in cultural courses. The activities in detail below:

Culture

✓ Dance course – Grupo Raices Doradas

Education

✓ Student training: crafts

As part of the coordination between the Ministry of Education and the company, a training activity was held to teach foamy crafts to students from El Bordo and El Cristalito with the aim of increasing students' skills during January.

There was an enrollment of 37 students from both schools. The craft course lasted 2 weeksand involved 6 craft projects: flower wreath, a sanctuary, a rose in a pen, a pencil holder, a caterpillar, a turtle and a bear, all of them decorative.





✓ Delivery of school supplies to teachers

APROSAIC and Condor Gold donated school supplies to 19 teachers from the Gonzalo García Vallejos Institute in Santa Cruz de La India.
